HISTORICAL SKETCH

The American Latvian Association was founded primarily by Latvian refugees who had left Latvia during and after World War II, fleeing the Soviet occupation of their homeland. Between 1949 and 1951, postwar Latvian immigrants established over 300 new American Latvian organizations and communities, creating a need to form a central organization that could unify them, as well as speak and act on behalf of Latvians.

On February 24, 1951, under the direction of Julijs Feldmans, 115 delegates representing more than 11,000 Latvians met in Washington, DC, and established the American Latvian Association. The first ALA convention laid down the ALA mission: to act not only as an umbrella organization for American Latvians, but also to create a unified front from which to influence world politics with respect to their Soviet-dominated homeland. In words from the first ALA congress:

"Without a doubt, a Latvian colony in the U.S. will come to play an important role in Latvian life outside Latvia. For this reason, it is imperative that we join together and create an organization which can freely express the thoughts of our people, our desire for freedom and our own place under the sun."

Thus the Latvians managed to largely unite both new and old immigrants in a common mission—to maintain national integrity in exile and fight for the freedom of their homeland. Those few who did not agree with the methods or ideology of the ALA simply did not participate in ALA activities.

The first organizational structure consisted of a president, five vice-presidents, a secretary, a treasurer, and a three-person "inspection committee." Bureaus of the ALA have included Cultural and Educational, Information and Advocacy, Social Welfare, and Sports. The ALA established as its financial base a program of collecting membership dues from its constituents and has, in its history to date, remained a self-sufficient, non-profit organization. Donations from the Latvian community at large have provided capital for many ALA projects, among which have been establishing a Latvian ethnographic museum in Reading, Pennsylvania, sponsoring sports tournaments, publishing educational materials, and producing films.

Among the ALA's first activities were its efforts to sponsor Latvians migrating to America following the 1952 amendment of the 1948 DP Act. Starting in the 1960s the ALA concentrated a significant effort towards the creation of educational curricula. By the early 1970s, the ALA had helped to found Latvian summer high school programs such as Beverina and Kursā and had become the foremost publisher of Latvian schoolbooks in the free world. Serial publications from the ALA that began during this time include *Latvian News Digest*, *ALA Žurnāls* (ALA Magazine), and *ALA Vēstis* (ALA News).¹ In addition, the ALA Cultural Fund supported a number of Latvian artists, writers, and performers.

The ALA is the leading Latvian advocacy organization and has been used by the United States government and by the media to speak on behalf of the Latvian people in matters of political and

cultural issues concerning Latvia. Members of the ALA have also proved valuable contributors to and participants in the efforts of international Latvian organizations such as the World Federation of Free Latvians (PBLA).

The headquarters of the ALA is in Rockville, Maryland. ALA conventions are held annually in different locations, drawing delegates representing ALA member organizations from throughout the United States. The main purpose of the conventions is to elect officers and adopt general guidelines on policy. The ALA represents over 160 secular and religious American Latvian organizations throughout the United States, as well as many individuals; it is the single largest Latvian organization outside Latvia, with over 7,800 members. In addition to overseeing the greater American Latvian community, the ALA now devotes significant effort toward providing financial and material aid to Latvia.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

The American Latvian Association collection consists of organizational records, reports, correspondence, subject files, and a large number of newspaper clippings. These records trace the history of the ALA from its inception in 1951 up to 1973. The collection is a unique compilation of documents that provides insight into the creation, growth, and activities of a singular ethnic organization that has managed to infiltrate every aspect of American Latvian life. Correspondence with numerous Latvian member organizations contains information on Latvian social and political activities throughout the United States on the local level.

The original gift included a large number of monographs and serials that have been removed from the manuscript collection and added to the IHRC print collection. A list of titles is included at the end of this inventory. The remainder of the collection measures ca. 9.5 linear feet and is housed in 19 boxes, with one package of oversize materials.

SERIES VIII — OVERSIZE MATERIALS

I. Administrative Materials

This series outlines the administrative structure and activity of the ALA through correspondence, meeting minutes, and activities reports.

Details regarding bylaws, membership, financial budgets and expenditures are in **Subseries 1**.

Subseries 2 is arranged by the bureaus of the ALA: information, culture, welfare, and sports. Except for the Sports Bureau, each bureau has subdivisions for special projects, most notably the Bureau of Culture's Cultural Fund. The folders contain yearly appraisals and plans, correspondence, and reports for each ALA bureau. **Subseries 3** documents yearly ALA conventions by detailing matters discussed and listing delegates who attended.

II. Latvian Communities and Individuals

This series is comprised of letters, clippings and other materials received from and about Latvian exile communities and individuals throughout the United States.

Subseries 1 is arranged alphabetically by cities and states, with folders containing church bulletins, local newspaper articles, and copies of correspondence with senators and representatives. Included are comprehensive reports of local Latvian activities sent to the ALA for inclusion in the "dzīves arhīvs" (life archive), a project of the ALA Bureau of Culture. Especially rich in materials are the folders for Detroit, New Jersey, New York, Oregon, Philadelphia, and Washington, D.C. The Oregon collection contains a folder of photographs that portray Latvian activities, as well as a detailed roster of local Latvians. Monthly U.S. Latvian press publications that chronicle events in various cities, which were originally found with these papers, have been removed to the IHRC print collection.

Subseries 2 contains correspondence with or about individual ALA members who, in this case, were men involved with the sciences. Most of this subseries consists of scientific treatises (many of which are in foreign languages) prepared by these men.

III. Organizations

This series is the collected correspondence and activities reports of organizations in which either ALA members were a part, or that acted on concerns of the ALA.

Subseries 1 are files on national and international Latvian organizations, including political, cultural, and religious groups (such as the Latvian Social Welfare group "Daugavas Vanagi" and the Latvian Council of Churches) that were either ALA members or otherwise operated in the interests of Latvians in exile. Located here is correspondence regarding the formation of Amerikas Latviešu Jaunatnes Apvienība (the American Latvian Youth Association) and Pasaules Brīvo Latviešu Apvienība (Latvian Free World Federation). Files on political organizations such as the early Baltic Committee of Washington, D.C. and the Joint Baltic American Committee, comprise **Subseries 2**.

The files in **Subseries 3** pertain to organizations whose activities were of interest to the ALA, and who primarily dealt with battling the spread of communism and working to liberate countries behind the Iron Curtain. Particularly well-documented are ALA relations with the Assembly of Captive European Nations and the All-American Conference to Combat Communism.

IV. Political Activities

Subseries 1 is documentation of various state commemorations of national- and state-declared Baltic, Latvian and Captive Nations days/weeks. **Subseries 2** contains correspondence and print materials dealing with issues such as exiles subjected to Soviet propaganda through the mail, United States policies regarding Latvian immigrants after 1951, and various governmental decisions regarding the Baltic States.

V. Clippings

The ALA collected newspaper and magazine clippings covering a wide range of issues. These clippings are from Latvian publications in the U.S. (primarily the newspaper *Laiks*) and abroad and from English and German language publications. (Clippings concerning Latvian individuals or activities in specific U.S. cities or states can be found in Series 2, "Latvian Communities.") This series is arranged chronologically by serialized Latvian newspaper articles, clippings in Latvian, and clippings from English/otherlanguage newspapers and magazines.

VII. Miscellany

This series includes published anti-Communism materials, advertisements, and subscription information about various Latvian publications; flyers and programs from U.S. and Canadian

Latvian Song Festivals; and a copy of a Latvian play submitted to the ALA as a contest entry.

VII. Assurances

These folders contain assurance applications and information about Latvians abroad who wished to emigrate under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953. Most of the refugees were living in Germany and Sweden. In most instances, their cases were denied. An index of names included is under separate cover.

VIII. Oversize Materials

This series is a collection of four posters (of which two promote the first American Latvian Song Festival in 1953, held in Chicago), a map of Latvia, and a certificate of merit from the World Federation of Free Latvians. Technical drawings for a Memorial Park that was never built are included here, more detailed information about which can be found in Box 11 under "Kara Invalīdu Apvienība" (War Invalid Association).
